FIBER BOOT CAMP: OH THE POSSIBILITIES...



Attention all artists, art students, and educators, anyone who wants an overview of basic techniques in fiber, this is the class! Tentatively scheduled are the basics in Spinning on a drop spindle, Microwave Dyeing with Kool-Aid, needle and wet Felting, Elemental Plaiting, Inkle Loom Weaving, Speed Tapestry Weaving, and Japanese Kumihimo Braiding. This class is packed, all techniques are explained on the most basic level, terrific for those who will be transferring the knowledge to students of their own, plenty of handouts, plenty of opportunities to explore fiber as an art form! **NO EXPERIENCE IN FIBERS NECESSARY! *Materials Fee***

SUPPLY LISTS:

a. Peters Valley will provide tables and chairs for participants to work, a screen for digital presentations, a microwave oven, a sink for rinsing, and a Power Strip. Please have available some clean wool fleece for spinning, and some wool roving, sliver or top appropriate for felting in light and dark and some small amounts of color for needle felting.

I will provide the laptop and projector for digital slide presentations, I have inkle looms, frame type tapestry looms. I will bring some roving for spinning felting and dyeing, drop spindles, Kool-aid for dyeing and kumihimo kits. Additional Pearl cotton yarn (3/2 or 5/2) for inkle loom weaving provided by Peter's Valley would be appreciated. I will bring enough for an initial project.

b. Students should bring:

- Scissors
- Large garbage bag
- Large Bath or Beach Towel
- A newspaper

- 4-5 brown grocery bags
- Rubber Gloves
- A pair of old jeans, any size
- A roll of bubble wrap (small bubbles)
